Letters for the month:

High frequency words for the month:

Cuando, también, vamos, mucho

Literacy: The three Little pigs, Goldie Locks and the Three Bears, The Three Billy Goats Gruff.

Math: We are learning to represent, count and write numbers to 10. Know number names and the count sequence, count to tell the number of objects, and compare numbers and understand addition as putting together and adding to, and understanding subtraction as taking apart and taking from.
